Association Updates

Recall that at the April 1 general meeting, the Development Committee proposed a Vertical Mixed Use (VMU) zoning overlay for most of the Anderson Lane commercial properties, but suggested withholding the density bonuses to help preserve neighborhood interests in any future VMU projects. The membership passed a resolution supporting this proposal, and at the May 13 Planning Commission meeting, committee members proposed this scheme and it was accepted without significant change. By the time you read this, City Council should have adopted the commission's recommendations.

At the April 21 board meeting, a representative of the owner of 8611 Mopac (the old Harold's Clothing Barn) explained plans to ask for a permit to serve alcohol. Though no tenant is lined up, the owner wants to convert the property to a "cocktail lounge." In consultation with the development committee, the Board passed a motion generally supporting the application but stating that our neighborhood was concerned about overflow parking at properties along Shoal Creek Blvd. due to pedestrian traffic crossing the railroad tracks on the east end of the property. When the matter finally came before the Zoning and Platting Commission on July 1, the Development Committee took action to restrict the Association's support of the alcohol permit for cocktail lounge use only.

At the May 6 general meeting, Annick Beaudet, from the City of Austin Bicycle and Pedestrian Program, described the planned re-striping of Steck. The section between Burnet and Shoal Creek Blvd. will be the subject of a "road diet," resulting in one car lane and one bike lane in each direction, with a shared left-turn lane. Similar projects in other cities result in increased bicycle use without a negative impact on the road capacity for vehicles. To verify the impact of this local project, a detailed before and after study is being conducted to measure Steck, as well as surrounding streets.

The "before" study in mid-April funded only weekday measurements, so several members of the Traffic Committee helped gather statistics on bicycle and pedestrian use over the weekend of April 19-20. The "after" measurements are planned for next spring. As part of regularly scheduled maintenance, the re-striping is currently planned between September and November. A second phase of the project is to figure out how bicycle lanes can be implemented between Shoal Creek Blvd. and Mopac.

The May 6 meeting also featured Gary Kosut, from the City of Austin Watershed Protection and Development Review Department. Mr. Kosut talked about

Neighbor Spotlight: the Tuccis on Benbrook

I first met Leon Tucci, Lieutenant Colonel, United States Air Force Retired, and his wife, Jean, 18 years ago. That was the first year that I distributed flags to the neighborhood on Memorial Day. When Leon and Jean saw my flags, he called and said, "Young lady, we would like to treat you to dinner." At that dinner, he thanked me and welled up with emotion as he told me of their only son, Major Robert Tucci, USAF, who was shot down in Laos during the Vietnam era and is still listed as Missing in Action. Robert had followed in his father's footsteps and became a USAF pilot flying F-4 Fighters. Colonel Tucci was a bomber pilot and flew missions in Europe during World War II.

When the news came of Robert's having been shot down, the Tuccis were stationed at Ramey Air Force Base in Puerto Rico. Jean says she was enjoying the gorgeous greenery and the colorful Flamboyant trees when she first heard the news. She says, "In an instant all that gorgeous greenery turned to a dull gray." A week later, Jean received the news that her mother had passed away. Through all these adversities she has been able to maintain a wonderful sense of humor. I have shared many wonderful times with my good friends, the Tuccis.



They are the original owners of their home on Benbrook which they had custom built by V.G. Mann. One of Jean's funny stories was about the temporary home they lived in while their home was being built. Mr. Mann had recommended a rental that his friend owned. The owner's wife came often to join them for coffee and to share homebuilding stories as she and her husband also had a home built by Mr. Mann. Jean says their landlord sent his "little red-headed wife to visit with them just to keep her out of trouble." As it turned out, I learned years later that "the little red headed wife" was my mother! Leon and Jean couldn't believe it. We laughed so hard that the news brought about a reason to share a nice bottle of Italian Chianti.

Both Leon and Jean have many stories about the colorful people and places they have known. The way their lives have intertwined is a story in itself. They were both born in Italy in towns approximately five miles apart, but never met there. Both families migrated to Detroit, Michigan, living only blocks apart. When they met, he was nine years old and she was seven years old. They have recently celebrated their 67th wedding anniversary!

I have never visited the Tuccis when I was not served some Italian goodie. One of my favorites is the Italian Biscotti that Jean often makes from a recipe she has been using for years. I've asked Jean for the recipe and she always replied, "You must come and watch me and then I'll gladly give you the recipe. There are some things that you must see to understand and appreciate." I finally did go to observe the making of the Biscotti. I feel very fortunate to receive the recipe for this Italian delight and I have Jean's permission to include it on the next page to share with our friends and neighbors.

ITALIAN BISCOTTI (All ingredients must be at room temperature)

3 cups all purpose flour	1 cup sugar
2 teaspoons baking power	3 large eggs, at room temperature
½ teaspoon salt	1 teaspoon vanilla extract
½ cup butter or margarine, softened	1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts (optional)

Heat oven to 350 degrees.

Grease one cookie sheet. Combine flour, baking powder, and salt in a medium bowl. Beat butter and sugar in mixer bowl until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla extract. Beat in dry ingredients until well combined. Stir in nuts (if desired). With floured hands, shape dough into two 12 inch logs about ¾ inch thick and 4 to 5 inches wide. Bake 25 to 30 minutes until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool on wire rack 20 minutes.

With a serrated knife, slice logs approximately ½ inch thick. Place cut side down on cookie sheet and bake again for 8 minutes. Turn cookies over and bake for another 8 minutes or until the cookie is just golden. Cool again on wire racks. Store in an airtight container at room temperature up to one week or freeze up to one month.

This recipe makes approximately 3 ½ dozen cookies.


the floodplain along Shoal Creek and how the new floodplain maps become official on September 26, 2008.

Most of the current FEMA floodplain maps in Travis County are based on out-of-date technical data prepared up to 29 years ago. In October 2003, FEMA initiated the Travis County Floodplain Map Modernization project that resulted in new digital floodplain maps and models. These maps show the 100-year and 500-year FEMA floodplains and the 25-year and 100-year City of Austin fully-developed floodplains in Travis County. The FEMA floodplains will be used for insurance rate purposes and are based on existing watershed land-use conditions. The City of Austin floodplain maps are used for land development regulation and floodplain management purposes and are based on fully developed land-use conditions.

Due to the City of Austin's flood control program that made improvements to Shoal Creek, many homes in our neighborhood are no longer in the floodplain. To find out if your property is affected, call your insurance agent or look at the new maps on the city web site (http://www.cityofaustin.org/watershed/floodplain_newmap.htm).

Mr. Kosut observed that with the new maps, some homeowners might not be required to carry flood insurance (based on their mortgage requirements). However, it is always a good idea to have flood insurance if you are near waterways.

Changes Coming for Austin Curbside Recycling

Today, we are bombarded by going “green” and recycling is one of the easiest ways to be more “green.” Chris and I have been married for eight years and I am the “environmentalist” in our house. I peel the paper off packaging to recycle and check for the appropriate 1 or 2 on the plastic products before we purchase them. I hate seeing how much stuff we throw away and knowing that the landfills are reaching their limits. I have done some research and found that you can “recycle” almost anything, including electronics and paint.

Currently in Austin, we recycle any plastic with the 1 or 2 symbol, aluminum cans, glass bottles and jars, paper, and steel or tin cans. Beginning in October, the city will be delivering blue, 90 gallon recycling carts to residential customers. We won’t have to sort items, because all the recycling will go directly in this cart. (The current blue bins will no longer be used for curbside recycling.) The collection crews will pick up the recycling using an automated truck and recycling collection will be picked up every other week.



A list of things that **can** be placed in the new recycling carts:

1. Paper: (newspaper, office paper, junk mail, cereal and soft drink boxes, corrugated cardboard)
2. Aluminum and metal cans: food cans (labels left on OK), soda cans
3. Glass: Jars and bottles
4. Rigid plastics: #1 through #7, including yogurt and margarine tubs. See chart below.

• Plastic bags and styrofoam (cups, egg cartons, take-out containers) **cannot** be placed in the recycling cart.

There are many places in Austin to drop off your unwanted household items. Our area has several accessible Goodwill and Salvation Army locations. If your items are in excellent or good condition you can donate them to places like Assistance League of Austin. They sell your donated items in their thrift store to raise money for programs that benefit our community. Listed below are websites that discuss different ways to recycle and be more “green.”

NSCNA Donations to Pillow Elementary

In 2002, Pillow Elementary asked NSCNA if they would be willing to donate \$500 to help pay for a new marquee sign outside the school. This donation was approved by the Board at the time, but it seems to have slipped through the cracks and the check was never presented to Pillow. Earlier this year, Sandy Perkins was speaking with Huddie Murray, the Pillow PTA liaison, when this topic was brought up. It turns out that the NSCNA requested the sign contain a message to help calm traffic and, for the longest time, there was a message asking people to "Drive Slow - school is in session" or something to that effect. Surprised to hear that our group seemed to have dropped the ball, the issue was brought up at a recent board meeting and our Secretary, Claudell Migl, was asked to look through past meeting minutes to verify that this donation was approved by a past NSCNA Board.

In the meantime, Pillow started a donation drive to help pay for new Elmo projectors. These digital projectors would replace their overhead projectors and help improve the classroom environment. The Board was made aware of this new request from Pillow and voted to donate \$532 to Pillow to pay for one new Elmo projector. A check was cut and issued to Pillow. A few months later, we received a number of Thank You cards from the Fourth grade class letting us know how happy the students are with the new Elmo projector. On the opposite page, we have scanned in a few of those Thank You cards for you to read. Some are insightful, some are down right funny. In the photo below, you can see the school's marquee with a message to the NSCNA thanking us for the Elmo donation.

Claudell was able to locate meeting minutes from 2002 that verified the approval of a \$500 donation to Pillow to help pay for a new marquee sign. This information was presented to the Board and we voted to cut another check for \$500 to honor the past promise. It is always a good thing to support our local schools and we look forward to a continued good relationship with our friends at Pillow Elementary.

Burnet Middle School News

Dear North Shoal Creek Association,

I would like to thank you and Ms. Sandy Perkins for your interest in supporting Burnet Middle School in its quest to become a Recognized Campus for the 2008-2009 school year. Let me tell you about our school, its students, and plans for the upcoming school year.

Burnet is the third largest school in the middle school district; we averaged 1,054 students the 2007-2008 school year. Our students' ethnicities are: 68% Hispanic, 18% African American, 9% white, and 5% other (this constitutes over 37 countries represented at Burnet).

Academic Status for the 2007-2008 School Year: Academically Unacceptable

Academic Status for the 2008-2009 School Year: **Academically Acceptable.**

This is a remarkable feat considering Burnet had a first year principal and 27 new staff members in the 2007-2008 school year.

Math scores increased from 41% to 71%.

Reading scores increased from 63% to 89%.

Burnet was awarded a grant from Intel and the Dell Foundation. Through the grant Burnet was given 1,000 computers, which were refurbished by our students and then given to needy households throughout the Burnet neighborhood. KEYE 42 covered the story on June 5, 2008.

Homework Harbor is set as follows: Monday – Social Studies, Tuesday – Math, Wednesday – Language Arts, Thursday – Science. This specialized tutoring takes place in the teachers' classrooms from 3:45 pm to 4:45 pm.

In-house Tutoring takes place from 8:00 am to 3:30 pm and is facilitated by ex-teachers and volunteers.




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Birds Barbershop opens on Burnet Road

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

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
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
