West Nile Virus: Facts and Prevention



The West Nile Virus has made its way to Texas, so we wanted to make our neighbors aware of precautions that can be taken to prevent mosquito bites and breeding as well as some facts about the virus. While many in the media are using the word 'epidemic' to describe this virus, it is important to remember that less than 1% infected with the virus become seriously ill and far less die from the virus. The best thing we can do is take precautions and be aware of the facts.

Facts about the West Nile Virus:

 Even if the mosquito is infected, less than 1% of people who get bitten and become infected will get severely ill.

 Among those with severe illness due to West Nile virus, case-fatality rates range from 3% to 15% and are highest among the elderly. Less than 1% of persons infected with West Nile virus will develop severe illness.

 West Nile encephalitis is NOT transmitted from person-to-person. For example, you cannot get West Nile virus from touching or kissing a person who has the disease, or from a health care worker who has treated someone with the disease.

- There is no documented evidence that a pregnancy is at risk due to infection with West Nile virus.

- In the temperate zone of the world (i.e., between latitudes 23.5° and 66.5° north and south), West Nile encephalitis cases occur primarily in the late summer or early fall. In the southern climates where temperatures are milder, West Nile virus can be transmitted year round.

- Most people infected with West Nile Virus will not show symptoms, the virus will run its course in a week to 10 days, and they will never know they had it. Some, however, may develop a fever, headache, body aches, and swollen lymph nodes. Although rare, death can occur. Those most at risk include the elderly and people with compromised immune systems from illness or drugs such as chemotherapy. There is no specific treatment for West Nile Virus infection. In a serious case, a person may have to be hospitalized and given supportive treatment along with good nursing care.

What You Can Do to Help Fight Mosquitoes:

- Do not allow water to stagnate in old tires, flowerpots, trash containers, swimming pools, birdbaths, pet bowls, etc. (Mosquitoes can lay hundreds of eggs in as little as a tablespoon of water)
- Empty and change the water in bird baths, fountains, wading pools, rain barrels, and potted plant trays at least once a week if not more often.
- · Drain or fill temporary pools with dirt.
- Keep swimming pools treated and circulating and rain gutters unclogged.

Steps You can Take to Prevent Mosquito Bites:

- · Stay indoors at dawn, dusk, and in the early evening.
- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants whenever you are outdoors.
- Spray clothing with repellents containing permethrin or DEET since mosquitoes may bite through thin clothing.
- Apply insect repellent sparingly to exposed skin. An effective repellent will contain 35% DEET (N,N-diethyl-meta-toluamide). DEET in high concentrations (greater than 35%) provides no additional protection.
- · Repellents may irritate the eyes and mouth, so avoid applying repellent to the hands of children.
 - Whenever you use an insecticide or insect repellent, be sure to read and follow the manufacturer's DIRECTIONS FOR USE, as printed on the product.
- Install or repair window and door screens so that mosquitoes cannot get indoors. Replace outdoor lights with "bug lights".
- Note: Vitamin B and "ultrasonic" devices are NOT effective in preventing mosquito bites.
- It does not appear that a person can get WNV from handling live or dead infected birds. However, use gloves or double plastic bags when handling any dead animals, including birds.

What Austin / Travis County Health and Human Services (A/TCHHSD) is Doing

Elements of the A/TCHHSD mosquito control program include public education, the treatment of drainage areas and standing water, and spraying. The Health Department provides a free mosquito assessment service in which technicians inspect property and recommend actions the homeowner can take to reduce the mosquito population. To request a site assessment or to report standing water or large volumes of mosquitoes, call The A/TCHHSD Environmental Health and Consumer Protection Unit at 972-5600. The third component of the mosquito control program, spraying, kills adult mosquitoes, and is about 10 percent of the overall mosquito control effort. The chemical used by the A/TCHHSD is EPA-approved and will not harm humans or animals. The spray kills only those active adult mosquitoes that come into contact with the chemical, and it retains its effectiveness for about eight hours. There is a "No Spray" list of residents who do not want mosquito spraying operations near their homes. No spraying will be done within 200 feet of the property of anyone on the "No Spray" list. To have your name included on the list, call 972-5600.

Eye on North Shoal Creek Residents

Meet the Anderson's!

Harold and Bernice Anderson moved into their house on Benbrook 32 years ago. They are a wonderful couple with much history to share. Harold is an outgoing gentleman who spent 14 months serving in World War II under General Patton. Bernice is a vivacious women who has witnessed an amazing period of change in this country. It is impossible to describe a lifetime in the one hour we spoke, but here are the highlights they shared with me.

Serving under Patton in World War II

Harold, know as "Andy" to his friends, went into the service in 1939. He trained at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio and then was selected to be an instructor at Fort Sill in Oklahoma. When he went overseas he joined General Patton's outfit. Harold described General Patton and being a "bloodthirsty man who didn't care about a man's life." During his tour he recalled trying to cross the Rhine River. The Germans had zeroed in on the American soldiers and the water began to turn crimson from the many fallen men. General Sylvester told Patton, "we cannot cross." Patton replied, "These men are expendable."

He remembered capturing a German vehicle. Patton wanted parts for the vehicle so Mr. Anderson was sent into enemy territory with a driver and an interpreter. They made it to the factory, found the parts and made it back safely. He said they received a commendation for their bravery and efforts.

He described another battle that he called the "Belgium Bulge" where they were surrounded by the Germans. They called for air support. The visibility was so poor that when the support arrived it dropped on our own men killing several thousands. Harold said that incident wasn't very widely reported.

After returning from World War II, Harold left the service. A colonel told him he was a staff sargeant with great potential to make it to the top. Harold said, "After a tour in Patton's outfit and what I had gone through I wanted out. I had a wife and a son, I wanted out." His request was granted. After he returned, he did not talk much about the war. He experienced a nervous breakdown that stemmed from combat exhaustion - 14 months of constant bombing and firing. He recalled a time shortly after when he and Bernice were shopping on Congress. As a car drove by it backfired. Harold said he embarassed Bernice

because he immediately dropped to the ground. Thinking back, Harold described the experience as "a bad dream."

Meeting Bernice

Bernice's nephew, Raymond, was in the service with Harold. Raymond's aunt and uncle were hosting a party and dance at their house. Raymond told Harold that he had an aunt that was his age and he wanted Harold to meet her. Raymond must have known that they would be a great fit, because Harold and Bernice were married on Armistice Day, November 11, 1942. Ironically, Raymond went on to marry one of Harold's first cousins!

After Harold left the service they settled in Austin, TX. Harold and Bernice chuckled as they remember Austin as a town of 65,000 people with 8,000 students at UT Austin. Harold spent 10 years as a salesman for Walter Tipps' company. He then worked 32 years for the Texas Highway Department using his supply experience. During that time, Bernice told Harold she wanted a job. They had a neighbor who worked at the Austin School District and helped Bernice get a job. She spent 25 years working for them. During this time Harold and Bernice had a side business cleaning office buildings and banks. Harold can remember nights when they would finish cleaning at 3AM, sleep for 2 hours and then be back up for their day jobs!

They moved to our neighborhood 32 years ago. Looking at housing prices today, they chuckle again when they mention that they paid \$29,950 for their home. They remember roaming cattle and horses in the prarie behind them. Bernice told me once when they were sitting in their kitchen eating breakfast, a horse ran right through the backyard. After that incident, they decided to build a wooden fence around their yard.

Traveling and Retirement

Bernice said that when they retired she told Harold they were going to travel to places they had not been. All their hard work afforded them the opportunity to visit 19 foreign countries. Harold had the opportunity to take Bernice to many places he had been during the war. They were also able to visit Harold's kinfolk in Sweden.

Life Today

Harold and Bernice have not slowed down. They play bingo and a domino game called "chicken foot" with friends several times a month. Bernice makes her famous fruitcake over the holidays which through wordof-mouth had become a little busines in itself. Thear the fruitcake it to die for! Harold keeps busy by spending 2 days a week working at Covert Ford. They have a grown son and daughter who both live here in Austin.

I want to thank the Anderson's for taking the time to speak with me!
