

Crime Prevention - David Watson

The Crime Prevention Action group's primary purpose is the keep our neighborhood safe. This year's initiatives focus on getting to know our neighbors and banding together as a neighborhood to protect it. The goals are to:

- Institute a Neighborhood Watch Program
- Focus on a "Know Your Neighbor" initiative



Neighborhood Beautification - Eric Thronson



The neighborhood beautification committee is designed to raise the standards of our community to reflect our pride in where we live. We hope to instigate a number of programs from a procedure to alert owners of a renter's neglect to perhaps "adopting" a neighbor's front yard who can't otherwise maintain it. Additionally we are interested in protecting and/or replacing our neighborhood's old-growth tree population. Principally the goal of this committee is to keep our neighborhood as attractive as possible, benefiting all in terms of property values.

Traffic Issues - Tara Thronson

This committee will work with the City of Austin to explore options to slow down traffic on the busiest streets in our neighborhood, Steck Ave and Rockwood Ln. We also plan to coordinate a workshop with the Pedestrian Safety Program through the Trans Texas Alliance in order to improve neighborhood safety.



Pillow Beautification - Laura Zimmerman

The Pillow Beautification project focuses on giving a complete "facelift" to Pillow Elementary. The initiative began with a tree drive to plant trees at Pillow. This planting will take place on March 27th. Other projects that need to be completed include:



- Planting gardens on the grounds

- Painting parts of the school building
- Cleaning up and building out the gazebo area
- Getting a sign for Pillow

Join the Yard of the Month Committee!!







Pillow Receives Texas Blue Ribbon Recognition!!!!

Pillow Elementary recently received Texas Blue Ribbon state recognition. Out of 7600 schools in Texas, Pillow is one of only 27 schools nominated by the Texas Education Agency for the National Blue Ribbon award. Outstanding state assessment scores in third, fourth, and fifth grade are major factors in this achievement. Of the 74 elementary schools in Austin, Pillow ranks in the top quartile in percentage of students commended for high scores on the newly designed and challenging TAKS test. Data analysis reveals no significant performance disparity among the various student groups. This is a remarkable accomplishment.

Our Ash Trees are Dying.... What You Should Do

"A great deal on Ash trees"

A local resident who is also a landscape architect commented that when they developed our neighborhood, they must have gotten a great deal on ash trees. These trees have a lifespan of approximately 40 years, so many of the ash trees in our neighborhood are dying. This is a great opportunity to replace your ash tree with a heartier tree such as a cedar elm or a live oak. The following article give you a great bit of information on how to choose a tree, a location and plant your tree.



The time to plant is Now

Winter is one of the best times to plant a tree. Many excellent varieties are available at your local nursery, with some of the best trees available in the winter. Your new tree will use the winter dormant season to establish new roots. When spring arrives, your tree will be on its way to providing shade for generations to come. While it may seen obvious that planting a tree is a good thing, here are some reasons which may not have not occurred to you. Well-placed trees can save you money on your utility bills. In the summer trees shade your roof and windows and also cool the air around your house as they breathe. In the winter, evergreens can block cold north winds. By using less electricity you help cut down on emissions from power plants that contribute to the "green house effect." Trees of course clean the air by creating oxygen, and they also keep our cities cooler by reducing the "heat island" effect. This is caused by concrete and asphalt storing and reflecting heat, making urban areas hotter.

Choosing a Tree

Ask your nursery professional to recommend a tree that is native or adapted to this area. Don't ask for the fastest growing tree such as an Arizona ash, cottonwood, Chinese tallow or poplar. Their fast growth results in weak, brittle wood. They are also prone to freeze and insect damage, leaving you with the expense of tree removal just when you expect to be receiving shade. Excellent deciduous trees for this area include Chinese pistache, cedar elm, Drake elm, pecan, Texas ash, and bald cypress. These trees will lose their leaves in the winter and provide access to the winter sun to warm your home. Two of the best choices in this category are the bur and chinquapin oaks. Recommended evergreen selections include live oak, Afghan pine, deodar cedar, and cherry laurel.





Tree Planting - Con't

Choosing a site

Survey your site and decide the best location for your tree. Choose the variety based on mature size compared to the space you have available. Most planting mistakes are made by placing a tree that will become very large in the wrong place; under a power line or too close to the house, driveway, or walkway. Don't place the tree near water, gas, cable TV, telephone or sewer lines. In Austin, phone One Call at 472-2822; they will locate and mark all underground utility lines in the digging area. In other locations, call your utility or service supplier. Now dig a test hole. Be sure your location is not one large limestone boulder with a thin layer of soil over it. If you hit a large rock, move over a bit and try again. When you are sure you can dig an adequate hole, then purchase the tree. When you know the size of the hole you can dig, your original plan for a large balled and burlaped tree may change to a five gallon size. The smaller size is easier to plant, less expensive, and may grow more rapidly than the larger tree.

Planting the Tree

Dig your hole three to five times as wide as the container or root ball. The hole should be no deeper than the container. If you disturb the native soil below the root ball, the tree may settle and sink too low. The sides of the hole should not be smooth. Dig an ugly, ragged hole or even a square hole. Use a pick or

shovel to break up the vertical soil surface. This gives the roots a chance to grow into the native soil. Carefully remove the tree from its container and place it in the hole. Large trees may require the aid of several helpers to avoid damaging the roots. If the roots have begun to circle inside the container, straighten them out from the root ball as you refill the hole.

Most times a newly planted tree will stand on its own. If necessary, drive a sturdy stake at the edge of the root ball. Use an old nylon stocking to loop a loose figure eight around the tree and the stake. Fill the hole with the removed soil, not peat moss, compost, or bagged soil. It's best to get the tree immediately accustomed to the soil in which it will be grow-

ing. Otherwise the roots tend to stay in the amended soil and never grow into the surrounding native soil. As you fill, compress the soil with your foot several times to prevent air pockets. Use the extra soil to build a dam around the edge of the hole. Water thoroughly and deeply. A liquid root stimulator may be used, but is usually not necessary.

Cover the area inside the dam with 3-4 inches of organic mulch. In the absence of rain, a good soaking every two weeks is sufficient during the winter. What is the Status of the New Library?

About a year ago, a community meeting was held to discuss construction of a new North Village Branch library at Steck Avenue. We hadn't heard any news in a while, so we contacted the Austin Public Library's Facilities Coordinator, John Gillum, to get the scoop. Here is his update:

"I am afraid that an update on the North Village Branch Library Replacement Project will not be heartening for any of us, but as the City of Austin finds itself in difficult budgetary times, I suppose we must face that reality.

During the budget formulation process for the current year (Financial Year 2004), the City Council voted to delay the construction and opening of a number of building projects approved by voters in the 1998 Bond Election. The North Village Branch Library Replacement Project was among those projects delayed by two years by that particular Council action. The new North Village Branch Library (at the previously purchased 2505 Steck Avenue site) is now scheduled to open its doors to the public on January 26, 2008 rather than at its earlier due date of January 21, 2006.

I am sorry that my report could not be more cheerful, but rest assure that when the City allows us to move forward on this project once again, we will do everything in our power to expedite the construction of this important neighborhood library facility. If there should be any further questions or concerns regarding this matter, please do not hesitate to let me know so that I may do my best to answer them."
