Candidate Forum Report

The North Central Austin's Neighborhoods Candidate Forum on April 13th was a great success. North Shoal Creek partnered with five other neighborhoods (Allandale, Brentwood, Crestview, Highland and Wooten) to host this forum. The forum was initiated as part of Sustainable Neighborhood's 2009 Room to Live ini-

tiative. They are seeking a "Minimum Open Space Requirement" (MOSR) for the city's new mixed use districts. Allandale, Crestview, North Shoal Creek and Wooten neighborhood associations have already passed motions supporting the MOSR and Highland intends to bring it to a vote.

The forum was an opportunity for us to inform the candidates about our common neighborhood concerns, and a chance for them to directly address them. Due to time constraints candidates were only asked two questions, one on open space and another on development. There was, however, a written questionnaire that was broader and went into more detail. You can view the 11 question survey

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President's Corner



The board is tasked with running the "business" side of North Shoal Creek Neighborhood Association. The budget was approved at the February board meeting. The budget is approximately \$3,300. The income is funded by dues and newsletter ad revenue. This year, our dues and past year tax refunds fund 39% of the budget, and the remaining 61% percent is from *last* year's newsletter. With the downturn in the economy, there is less interest in newsletter advertising, so there is no projected net income from this year's publication of the newsletter. Speaking of which, I want to thank Sandy Perkins for single-handedly selling all the newsletter ads last year (and this year, so far). The ad revenue essentially funds the organization.

The expenses are summarized in the pie charts. The Expense Budget pie chart shows that we continue to prioritize neighborhood events like the July 4th parade. The parade is expensive because insurance and health department regulations make hiring a company to run the events the best choice. We continue to support Pillow Elementary, and we also approved paying for three years of the website (to save money on the annual fee). We have general operating expenses like post office box rental and filing fees. Meeting expense includes copies, notices, and occasional rental fees. The committees account for 15% of the budget, and the relative break down of committee budgets is shown in the pie chart labeled "Committee Budget Allocation".

If you want to help out and meet some of your neighbors, consider volunteering to help with some of the upcoming neighborhood-wide events. Events like the July 4th parade and National Night Out (in October) can use help, as well as upcoming Social Committee events. Give your favorite board member a call and get involved!

Beautification Committee News

I'm so excited by the response I've been getting for the Beautification Committee. Our first meeting on Sunday, May 3, produced an abundance of ideas and narrowed our goals down to a few ongoing projects.

We are continuing our goal of adopting Pillow Park through the Austin Parks Foundation Adopt-a-Park program. This is a fantastic opportunity for our neighborhood to take a more vested ownership in the park and help improve it through volunteer work days and grant projects. We'll be planning a neighborhood get-together in the park to talk about what improvements we would like to see and what we can do as a community to work toward them. We are initially trying to get park benches, replace the exercise equipment near the east-ern edge of the track, and eventually get some more picnic tables under the trees. Initial volunteer work will likely include raking gravel back into the playscapes and building a stone path to cover the dirt path from the sidewalk to the playscape by the school driveway.

Another project I'm really excited about is our Yard Mentoring Program. We'll be hosting quarterly workshops— informal gatherings with a local speaker and neighbors talking about what plants work well in the Austin climate, how to tend and replace our trees (as many are at the end of their life cycles), and ways to improve our neighborhood and reclaim green spaces.

We're trying to establish a go-to person/group for organic, native and general yard and garden help. We're also looking for volunteers to help neighbors who are unable to care for their yard due to illness or other circumstances.

Safety Committee Update

The Safety Committee is organized to communicate information regarding crime rates and prevention issues to our membership and all who live in our neighborhood. The City of Austin, APD and other groups like ours are resources that are available for use.

Historically economic downturns are quickly followed by an increase in crime rates. Two of those statistics, burglary and family violence, have a direct impact on neighborhoods and their residents. A recent download from the APD Central West District indicates that burglaries in the first quarter of 2009 have increased 35% from the first quarter of 2007

Recent home burglaries point to an organized effort on the part of the individuals who are farming this neighborhood. They have done their homework before they make a decision which house to target. They have 'previewed' the area, studied the actions of residents and determined the streets best suited for a quick escape to Mopac or 183. These burglaries are occurring during the day and probably involve a 'team' of 2 or 3.





The most commonly reported crime in this neighborhood is burglary of a vehicle. This action requires no planning, usually occurs after dark and can easily be done by one person. They are after contents left visible by the owner and electronics in or on the dash. Damage to windows and the dash are almost always a result of this crime.

There are tools to help us but the best one is communication. If you are interested in participating in the Safety committee, or if you just want to come to meetings and listen, please email **safetychair@nscna.org** or call Lynda Oakes at 467-7781.

We plan to have a meeting in May and are asking APD to have an officer or representative to meet with us. Other meetings will be held as frequently as needed. We will keep you informed.

General Meeting Summaries

March General Meeting

The March 3, 2009 General Meeting had 30 members in attendance, and Frances Hargrove spoke about the City's 3-1-1 system. See the article on page 10 for details about the interesting talk.

Helen Maham, Treasurer, gave a report on the 2008 finances, and presented the 2009 budget. The budget income is based on 60 member households (down from 158 in 2008). Questions were raised about the purpose of the CD. The question was referred to the traffic committee, namely to investigate the history of the CD and recommend a potential traffic calming use for the money.

Chip Rosenthal, Development Committee Chair, reported that the site plan for First Texas Honda (the former BMC West site) can receive administrative approval, so no public hearing is required.



Dallas Maham, Traffic Committee Chair, reported that Steck was finally being re-striped. (The new lane configuration was not marked at the time of the meeting.)

Cheri Hartman, Beautification Committee Chair, announced the recent yard of the month award at 2706 Thrushwood. A grant with Keep Austin Beautiful is being examined, as well as ways to work with the City to improve Pillow Park.

Alyssa Hedge, Social Committee Chair, discussed several ideas for neighborhood social events. The first is a coffee and taco gathering on Saturday mornings at Pillow Playground.

May General Meeting

There were 22 people at the May 5, 2009 General Meeting, and the guest speaker was A.J. Padilla, a local Austin firefighter. Station 8 at 8989 Research Blvd is our local station, and we (the public) are invited to stop by anytime for a tour—no need to call. If you have a tour group, call the Public Education Office at 974-0290 to schedule a time. Firefighters work for 24-hour shifts, living at the station for 1 day of duty, followed by 2 days off. So, a fire fighter normally works one of every three days.



One of the purposes of the visit was to explain fire truck staffing in light of the City budget talk to reduce the number of fire fighters on some trucks. Several industry associations as well as an Austin Fire Department study recommend a 4 person crew on engines for better safety and improved response. One interesting point of discussion was that Texas statute defines what is called the 2-in/2-out rule, which means two firefighters are needed to enter a building, while two more remain outside the fire. Thus, a minimum of four firefighters are needed on scene to even enter a building on fire. Of course, if there is definite knowledge that someone is inside, the fire fighters can enter to rescue the victim.

Additionally, Mr. Padilla explained that approximate 80% of calls are for medical emergencies. Accidents that require medical attention are labor intensive, requiring two or more fire fighters to attend to each victim. Based on some questions, other interesting facts were related.

- There is no city residency requirement for Austin fire fighters, and very few communities across the country have such a requirement.
- The target response time (from the 9-1-1 call to firefighters at your door) is less than six minutes.
- The fire department does not charge for a response, though the city/county EMS can bill for services.
- Speed bumps of the "speed cushion" variety do not slow down fire engines, as the wide wheelbase can • straddle the cushion.
- The blue reflectors on the street mark the location of a fire hydrant, though the city street department has stopped routinely placing them in the dense portions of the city.

After the question and answer period, officer and committee reports were given.

Helene Maham, Treasurer, reported that she had filed for a refund on previous years' tax withholding to recover it. The original mix up came from someone's social security number being associated with our association (instead of the Federal Tax ID Number). The old bank accounts were closed and the money was transferred to Randolph-Brooks Federal Credit Union. The reason for the transfer was poor customer service. The "traffic calming CD" was transferred to its own money market account, as the rates look better than a CD.

Lynda Oakes, new Safety Committee Chair, introduced herself. See the article on page 7 for more information about upcoming safety committee activity. Vehicle burglaries are always a concern, and these can be reduced by removing items that are visible from outside a car.

Dallas Maham, Traffic Committee Chair, distributed minutes from the recent Traffic Committee meeting. The city's traffic calming program is on budget hold this year. Sidewalk improvements are a topic to address. Some potential traffic calming uses for "the CD" are being researched.

Cheri Hartman, Beautification Committee Chair, reported that the committee is working on a yard mentor program to bring together experienced and lessexperienced neighbors. Also, a grant to improve Pillow Playground from Austin Parks Foundation is being researched. They are also looking at adopting the park.



Alyssa Hedge, Social Committee Chair, reported that the Late Night Mamas Dessert and Dish on April 30 was a success. The Pillow playdate on Saturday morning was well attended. Suggestions for other events were solicited. Juliette Kernion is organizing the neighborhood garage sale for May 16.

The Media Committee, which publishes the newsletter and maintains the website, needs help selling ads, and articles are always welcome. The next newsletter deadline will be August 1.

Austin 3-1-1

The guest speaker at the March 3 general meeting was Frances Hargrove, Communications Information Referral Manager with Austin's 3-1-1 system. She described the 3-1-1 service, which began receiving Austin Police Department non-emergency calls in 2001. The first Public Works call was received February 25, 2005. Currently, there are 84 agents that staff the call center 24 hours per day, seven days per week. This staff handles over 100,000 calls per month.



Your All Day, Any Day, Info Center

The City's call center is primarily funded by Austin Energy, as it redundant with Austin Energy's call center for disaster recovery purposes. The Austin Energy center is staffed nine to five on weekdays, but the City's center runs day and night. Currently, nine departments respond to 3-1-1 calls. All calls originate at the main call center, and then are routed to appropriate departments.

There are several other X-1-1 services. Emergencies are reported to 9-1-1, and any true emergency call to 3-1-1 is transferred to 9-1-1. The United Way staffs a 2-1-1 call center, which responds to social service emergencies, like counseling needs or helping people who find themselves homeless. The Call Before You Dig number is 8-1-1, which connects you to the local One Call Center to mark underground utilities. Of course, 4-1-1 is the expensive way to look up a phone number.

Some areas reserve 5-1-1 for public transit information, but not in our area. The 6-1-1 connects you to your phone company's customer service. The 7-1-1 number is reserved for the telecommunication relay service that helps deaf users make phone calls. When a TTY caller or a non-TTY user calls the relay number, the operator will dial the number he wishes to contact and relay the messages between two parties using voice and TTY. Note that only the 9-1-1 center can do a reverse address lookup, or even identify the dialed number. The 3-1-1 service cannot reverse lookup your address. Phone carriers are required to provide a 9-1-1 service, but the others are optional. For example, as of the meeting, the AT&T Uverse service does not connect to 3-1-1. The alternate direct dial number is 974-2000. Cell phone provides typically do not provide some of the alternate X-1-1 services, because the city receiving the call can be hard to determine.

The website <u>www.austin311.org</u> describes the over 40 services that are available. For example, if you drop your cell phone down a sewer, call 3-1-1 and a crew can be dispatched to recover it. The goal of the 3-1-1 call center is to resolve every call, so there is no time limit on calls. The City Manager supports the call center as the citizen's interface to city government. Call information is used to proactively address problems, for example graffiti. Issues are escalated as needed to resolve the problem.



Commander's Forum

After countless excuses, I finally made the time to attend the April 7, 2009 Commander's Forum for our police district: Central West (within the North Bureau). The main focus of the meeting was to introduce the new police department organization. There are three main "bureaus", which allows resources to be shifted quickly within a fairly large area. This is currently done weekly, based on crime statistics. The hope is to do this on a 24 hour cycle with good statistics gathering.

There are several district representatives within each bureau that act as a department liaison for local concerns and follow trends in criminal activity. These police officers also conduct patrol duties. If there is an issue of concern, contact our district representative to report problems, ask for more detail, or ask for directed patrols.

Attending the forum gets your voice heard. Three residents from our neighborhood were able to voice concerns, and spoke to our district representative to arrange directed patrols. Lesson learned: your attendance will have direct impact on your concerns.

The big crime prevention tip of the night: don't leave items visible in your car. A thief can break in and take the stuff in less than 5 seconds. Don't tempt a thief.

Just in case things are stolen, write down identifying information. If the police recover stolen articles, you need to prove it is yours to have it returned. Write down serial numbers, and report them in the event of a theft. Also, consider engraving or writing some identifying information on your "stuff". If stolen, you can report the identifying marks, and it will be entered in a database--just in case it is recovered. For example, you could write your driver's license number on CDs you keep in your car. If recovered, the police can search the database, determine the owner, and it can be returned to you.

Lastly, help with speeding traffic. Incidents can be reported to the district representative, who can track trends. If things are bad, the police have three tools: (1) a white trailer "you are speeding" sign that flashes current speed, (2) recording equipment to measure vehicle speeds over a period of time, and (3) enforcement by a live officer. The "speed sign" attempts to remind drivers they are speeding. The recording devices analyze a problem, and police officer enforcement is a short term solution. On an interesting note, most neighborhood speeding enforcement catches neighborhood residents.


