It was suggested that folks who do put up signs take them down after a week or two. Another issue to be aware of is that vehicle parking on grass in the front yard is also prohibited by City Ordinance. That said, please know that our neighborhood association does not turn anyone in for these violations! (We are not a homeowners' association, tasked with enforcing these rules.)

This Fall also brings with it a need for new volunteers. At the September 1 meeting, we will select a five person nominating committee. In December, we will need election committee members. And this fall will also be the time to speak up about getting involved for next year. We have eleven board positions to elect at the January meeting, and several of us have reached our term limits. Lalena Fisher and Chuck Eddy, along with their one-year-old daughter, are relatively new to the neighborhood. In March, they moved from Queens, NY, to the triplexes at Crosscreek and Shoal Creek. Having lived in New York for 14 and 11 years respectively, they had grown tired of the high cost of living and the fast pace. They both do freelance work from home, and they realized that nothing was really holding them in NY, so they decided to move closer to family (Lalena's family lives in Houston). With its laid-back, liberal vibe, and active publishing, video game, and music scene, Austin seemed like a natural fit.

Lalena is a freelance artist and illustrator. She's currently illustrating a book for a local publisher, and she's working on a comic strip for a soon-to-be-launched webzine for girls aged 9-15. She left her rock band, The Color Guard, in New York, but she'll be volunteering for the Girls' Rock Camp this summer and is looking for open mike venues for some solo gigs.

Chuck works as a freelance music critic, writing for Rolling Stone, Spin, Rhapsody.com, the Village Voice, among others. His niche in music has evolved over the years; he still writes mostly about rock, but he also writes about jazz, pop, hip hop, and alternative music, and lately he's been writing a lot about country music.

Over 35 booster clubs and academic organizations will participate in what is sure to become a community-wide tradition that celebrates the best of Anderson High School.

Coordinated by the Anderson High School PTSA, Trojan Spirit Fest was the idea of Principal Donna Houser. Currently beginning her third year at Anderson, Mrs. Houser saw the need for an event that was open to the entire community, celebrating the excellent public schools and camaraderie that is evident in the northwest part of AISD.

Development Committee News

The Development Committee monitors building activity, primarily commercial projects, in the neighborhood. We work with neighbors, developers and the city when development issues arise. Sometimes things get crazy busy, with activity all around our neighborhood. This, however, is not one of those times, thanks to the recession.

The biggest development project in the neighborhood right now is taking place on the old lumberyard property at the corner of Steck Avenue and Shoal Creek Boulevard. First Texas Honda will be moving into this location. The project is being processed by the City under an administrative approval, with no public hearings, because neither zoning variances nor conditional use permits were required.

The Development Committee has been working with Sustainable Neighborhoods of North Central Austin (www.snaustin.org) in support of improved green space (such as "pocket parks") and neighborhood connectivity (walking and biking routes). SN is working with the surrounding neighborhoods to improve pedestrian/ bike access from residential areas to commercial districts such as Anderson Lane and Burnet Road. We are looking at possibilities for new and improved pathways. These pathways not only improve connectivity, but also improve neighborhood aesthetics and reduce crime risks. We currently are working with SN to identify specific projects that the neighborhood could support.

North Shoal Creek is one of the few neighborhoods in Austin without a neighborhood plan, and it looks like we won't be getting one anytime soon. During the neighborhood planning process, stakeholders meet with the City to develop long-term objectives and goals for development in the neighborhood. The City currently is engaged in a city-wide comprehensive planning process. The City staff that normally would participate in the development of neighborhood plans are assigned to that project, and the neighborhood planning process is on hold.

The Development Committee is investigating the impact this will have on our neighborhood.

Adopting Pillow Park

I've recently been talking with neighbors who have lived in the neighborhood for over twenty years and heard so many stories about watching their children play under the same Pillow Park oak trees our children play under. I'm looking forward to telling similar stories about all of the trees that line the school property. Someday, they'll be fantastic shade for future neighborhood kids.

The Beautification Committee is organizing an effort for NSCNA to officially adopt Pillow Park and is also applying for a park improvement grant. We are working with the Austin Parks Foundation to increase community involvement in the park. We are also working together with Pillow Elementary and the Pillow Elementary PTA. Our goal is to improve the park, so what are the next steps? The playscapes are great and we love the shade of the oak trees. We'd like to add some simple things:

- Benches around the playscapes
- Additional picnic tables in the shade
- New exercise equipment on the side of the track A sign at the park entrance where we can post notices

The wooden sit-up incline bench has already been removed due to damage by age, and the other wooden pieces are worn out and out of date. The City has approved the fitness equipment on the Triactive America website (http://www.triactiveamerica.com/products.php). If you would like to have input on what exercise equipment is chosen, please contact me. We'll be setting up a meeting to discuss it further this fall. We'll have to consider costs- how much money we raise vs. how much grant money we get approved – and the needs of the school, though I'd prefer adult-sized equipment.

So what is involved in adopting a park? What do we have to do to get all of these cool improvements? The Beautification Committee has already met with the park district supervisor and the Parks Foundation to discuss our goals. Next, we as a neighborhood need to meet to discuss these goals. We need to decide on the exercise equipment, discuss placement of benches and tables, and talk about other things we would like to do. We'll get a start at our next general meeting on September 1st. A Beautification Committee meeting in the park will follow (I'm waiting for it to cool off first).



After that, we start fundraising from neighbors and local businesses. I would welcome anyone's help and ideas with this. Next, we offer volunteer labor to help clean up the park. The Parks Foundation has come out and surveyed the park and suggested that we gather the gravel that has fallen away from under the playscapes and put it back, and that we create a stone path from the blocked driveway on Rockwood to the park area (where the path has already been made from foot traffic). The Parks Foundation will provide tools and assistance. Again, I'm waiting until it cools off before even considering organizing a clean-up. Right now it's too hot to even think about trying to gather volunteers.

Last, we have a big neighborhood picnic party.

Nominating Committee News

At the next general meeting (September 1), we will choose a Nominating Committee. The committee will have five members, and it needs to be formed by October 1 of each year. Generally, the nominating committee is made up of individuals who are not running for a board position. So, if you are interested in participating on the committee or as a nominee for a board position, or if you have questions, please let me know (Jeff Russell at 415-9809).

The duty of the committee is to recommend at least one candidate to each of the four officer positions and seven director positions. I encourage the committee to accept all qualified candidates, and present more than the 11 candidates if that many people express an interest. The reality of the situation, though, is the committee spends its time recruiting 11 volunteers to fill the board positions.

The Election Committee members conduct the election at the January meeting. This committee is selected by the Board of Directors, usually in December. Our bylaws describe a detailed election procedure, which essentially is a separate election for each of the 11 board positions. This means the seven general board candidates are nominated for specific positions, rather than choosing all seven directors with one big, multiple-selection vote (like past years). Of course, anyone can be nominated from the floor during January elections, so you have until the last minute to decide to get involved!

Grow Green: Tips on Native Landscaping Workshop By Cheri Hartman

Are you tired watching the Texas heat sear your yard a crispy brown? Tired of overly dramatic weather forecasters trying to make 97° sound cool and refreshing? Do you remember a thing called "rain"?

Austin's summers are brutal, and when water is in short supply it's neither practical nor responsible to constantly run sprinklers in the hope of coaxing some non-native green into your yard. So what's a homeowner to do?

Join us for the Beautification Committee's first Yard Mentoring workshop, Grow Green: Tips on Native Landscaping. Learn the basics of landscaping and maintaining a yard or garden that thrives in the Texas heat. Denise Delaney from the City's Watershed Protection and Development Department will lead a discussion and share tips from Austin's Grow Green program (www.growgreen.org).



Grow Green is a landscaping plan designed specifically for Central Texas. It focuses on native plants and water protection (much like xeriscaping) and is helpful in choosing plants that are naturally resistant to heat, drought and pests. These plants thrive on minimal care, reducing the need for harmful lawn chemicals and helping protect our Shoal Creek watershed. We will have a slide presentation, workbooks, and ample time for questions.

The Traffic Committee is continuing to pursue positive dialogue with commercial businesses affecting NSCNA. We are talking to businesses on Buell. We are hoping to have improved working relationships with these businesses. The goal is to relieve noise and congestion affecting NSCNA homeowners.

Sidewalk inventory, as to existing sidewalks and their condition has been completed. We will examine options to make sidewalk use safer and less hazardous.

The terrible traffic congestion affecting our Thrushwood-Primrose area arising from bingo has been solved. It would be nice to take credit for this but the reality is the Bingo operation has relocated. There is still parking within NSCNA area when Roller Derby is held at the skating rink. 



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
