Neighborhood Partner Project

The Neighborhood Partner Program (NPP) provides an opportunity for Austin neighborhood associations to coordinate small (less than \$75,000) and medium (\$75,000 to \$150,000) projects with the City. Part of the coordination requires that the neighborhood association pays for at least 25% of the project's cost. The payment can be achieved through cash, "in-kind services," or "sweat equity."

Earlier this year, several NSCNA members contacted the Board regarding sidewalk repairs. Based on members' interests, the NSCNA submitted a non-binding letter of intent to the NPP regarding our interest in sidewalk repairs. Before entering into a binding agreement, the Board wanted to gauge members' current interest and participate in an official vote.

NSCNA members had an opportunity to participate in a survey regarding NPP. The survey asked members to indicate whether NSCNA should consider spending money from the neighborhood association CD to participate in the program. The survey also provided members with an opportunity to rank possible projects and suggest alternate projects. The survey results were mailed to members on October 12. The surveys were only used to gauge interest.

On October 19, members met to discuss the NPP and to take an official vote on whether or not to participate. At the meeting, NPP committee members shared further information on some of the possible projects. NSCNA members had the opportunity to ask questions and share thoughts regarding general participation in the program and specific projects.

Based on discussions, the following motion was proposed, discussed, and voted on:

- 1. NSCNA to submit an application to the City of Austin Neighborhood Partner Program for sidewalk repairs
- 2. NSCNA to furnish up to \$20,000 in cash match funds for this sidewalk repair project; and
- 3. NSCNA to work to develop additional non-cash matching funds through means such as volunteer "sweat equity" and material donations from businesses.

The majority of NSCNA members present at the meeting voted in favor of the motion. The vote from the October 19 meeting is the official membership vote, and the NSCNA Board will proceed based on the membership vote. The City of Austin has been informed of the decision to proceed with sidewalk repairs. We are currently awaiting

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President's Corner

One thing I've enjoyed these past several months is hearing feedback from neighbors. My

contact information is published in this newsletter and on the website. and from time to time neighbors will use that to ask me a question or share a concern. It's often rewarding, and I find it helpful to me to hear about issues outside my quiet little block of the neighborhood.

I'd like to use this column to give the neighborhood a bit of my own feedback, arising from what I've heard in those calls and emails.

One thing I'd like to do is clarify the difference between a neighborhood association (like NSCNA) and a homeowners' association (HOA). The names sound similar, but they are very different things. An HOA typically is created by a property developer to control the appearance and manage the common assets in a subdivision or development. A neighborhood association, on the other hand, is a voluntary organization of people who get together to advocate for their neighborhood. The City of Austin has a broad network of neighborhood associations, and these groups often are the strongest representatives of residents' needs and interests.

That's why NSCNA gets involved

in areas such as development, transportation and safety. We try to represent neighborhood interests on these sorts of issues before the city.

Individual property appearance issues, for instance, might be something an HOA would take up, but neighborhood associations generally don't. If you contact me with such an issue, I'll probably direct you to the City of Austin "Code Compliance" department, which does follow up on some of these issues. I mention this not because I mind the contact – I just want to save you a step. You can get more information at http://www.ci.austin. tx.us/code/compliance/ or by calling 311.

Sometimes I hear about issues that the association can do something about – if we've got the resources to do so. We're a volunteer organization, so we can only do the things that we have volunteers for. So far, we've been having a great year with our programs – and we'll be able to take on even more if we have the volunteer resources.

If there is a neighborhood issue that concerns you, I hope you'll consider offering your support to one of our committees. It's a great way to meet your neighbors, and help on the issues that are important to our neighborhood.

Neighborhood Safety News



Crime Analysis

Property crime in our neighborhood continues to decline. Throughout the year, we've been seeing a steady decrease in residential theft and burglary. Automotive theft and burglary have been persistently stubborn through the year — until now. In recent months, we've finally seen improvements in the neighborhood automotive theft and burglary rates.



The property crime rates shown in the accompanying graph show continued reductions through the year, with a low of three residential property crimes total in the month of September.

To a large extent, the crime rates in our neighborhood have been following citywide trends. Our efforts to secure our property and watch for suspicious activity are helpful, to keep our neighborhood from being an attractive target to thieves.

The improvements are welcome, but we're not at zero, which means there is still more work to do. It's more important than ever to file a report with the Austin Police Department if you are the victim of a crime. We need to bring even minor incidents to the attention of APD, to be sure we continue to get the support we need.

As always, please secure your valuables around your home, remove them from your car, watch for suspicious activity, and call it into 911 immediately.

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Tree Grant Update

Members at the September 7 meeting approved a motion to submit the Beautification Committee's grant proposal to the City of Austin's Urban Forest Grant. The grant request, titled "North Shoal Creek Urban Heat Island Mitigation Project," asks for \$7,000 to buy and plant 15 medium-sized trees (15-20 gal.) in yards where more street shade is needed, and 10 larger trees (25-30 gal.) in yards of homeowners who remove dead or dying trees from their yards (at their own expense).

It also asks for \$2,400 to hire a certified arborist to survey the neighborhood, report where trees are most needed and recommend what species to plant.

The grant request has been mailed, and we hope for a response from the City in November.

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
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
