Neighborhood Cost Sharing

This year, Austin neighborhoods have their first opportunity to participate in the Neighborhood

Cost Share Program (NCSP). The NCSP stems from Austin City Council Resolution No. 20090924-72, which passed in September 2009. The NCSP provides an opportunity for the city and neighborhoods to work together to develop and carry out neighborhood improvement projects that involve city-owned property or areas that are in the city's right of way.

Neighborhoods can choose to work with the NCSP on small projects that cost less than \$75,000 (such as tree planting) or medium projects that cost between \$75,000 and \$150,000 (such as new playgrounds). Neighborhoods are expected to provide at least 25 percent of the total project cost "through cash contributions, the market value of in-kind services, or a reasonable estimate of donated labor ('sweat equity')."

Neighborhoods interested in participating in the NCSP must submit a non-binding letter of intent to the City that includes the general project, the estimated cost and the ability to provide at least 25 percent of the total project cost. The letters

of intent are reviewed on a quarterly basis. After city officials vet the letters of intent, qualified neighborhoods will receive invitations to officially apply to the NCSP. At this point, invited neighborhoods can decide if they want to submit official applications. City officials will then review official applications.

The City expects to approve 10-12 small project programs and 4-7 medium project programs each fiscal year. City officials will work with approved neighborhoods to develop and implement the projects. Please refer to the President's Corner on page 2 about one project our neighborhood is considering.

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President's Corner

What would you do if you had \$30,000 to spend to make our neighborhood a better place? That's not an academic question. It's something our association has to address.

In 1998, the neighborhood reached a development agreement with Town North Autoplex that provided \$25,000 for "neighborhood traffic calming efforts or any other neighborhood project." Attempts for traffic calming projects stalled when the city withdrew for lack of funds. Our funds have remained in a reserved account, gathering interest.

A new City of Austin initiative, the Neighborhood Cost Sharing Program (NCSP), provides an opportunity to leverage these funds for significant work. Please read Kate Brien's article for information on the NSCP.

There are numerous ways we could spend this money. A few of the possible projects that come to mind are sidewalk improvements, traffic calming, and Pillow Playground features. I wish we could do all of it, but we can't. Improvement projects are expensive. We need to identify what will bring the neighborhood the most benefit for the money.

In June, the NSCNA Board of Directors voted to form a committee that will develop a proposal for sidewalk improvements. Over the coming months we'll discuss what that project could look like, and whether that seems like a good way to spend our money. We'll talk about this at our next General Meeting.

General Meeting, September 7

Please join us for the September General Membership Meeting. Don't think of it as another boring meeting — think of it as an opportunity for neighborhood improvements such as safer streets and more trees.

Here are some of the topics we expect to cover:

Steck Ave. Restriping - The restriping was done as an "experiment," and the city wants our input on whether we want to keep it or turn it back. A representative from the city

Neighborhood Connectivity Division is scheduled to attend.

Neighborhood Cost Sharing Program - As discussed elsewhere in this issue, this project could result in the largest monetary investment this association has ever made in this neighborhood.

Urban Forestry Grant Program - The Beautification Committee has prepared an application to get grant funds for tree planting in the neighborhood. This needs membership review and approval.

Bond Election and Anderson Trail Project

The latest Development Committee update concerns the City of Austin transportation bond election in November and the Anderson Trail project.

Transportation Bond Election

The city will hold a bond election this November for transportation-related projects. The \$90 million bond package will be split about 60/40 between road projects and bicycle, pedestrian and transit projects. The most famous of the pedestrian projects in the bond package is the proposed “boardwalk” extension of the hike-and-bike trail around Lady Bird Lake, east of Congress Avenue. Bonds for expanding our light rail system were originally considered but are not included in this bond election.

Anderson Trail Project

The city created a list of transportation projects to be funded by these proposed bonds. One project that NSCNA joined others in requesting for the project list is the Anderson Trail Project, a plan for a walking/bike path from Ashdale Drive to Anderson Lane.

The benefit to NSCNA of this one-block path would be an easier and safer path for neighborhood residents to the retail stores on Anderson Lane. The project would improve an existing path already in use by pedestrians walking north or south between Ashdale and Anderson Lane. The proposed improved path would run along the east side of the Village shopping center, with about half its length beside the new Office Depot on Anderson Lane. The project would include a paved path and safety features such as nighttime lighting. The trail would continue down Northcross Boulevard and Foster Lane

over to Shoal Creek Boulevard, safely connecting two neighborhoods and the retail shopping in between.

NSCNA members passed a resolution to support this path in 2009. It would give us greater transportation options and could help reduce traffic and pollution in our neighborhood.

The city has considered funding many citizen-nominated mobility projects, but there is not enough money to fund them all. We are happy to report this project was rated highly enough to make it into the final list for funding consideration. We have worked to promote the trail with Sustainable Neighborhoods of North Austin, who have been instrumental in moving this forward. Let’s extend our thanks to Steven Zettner and the rest of the Sustainable Neighborhoods group.

National Night Out

Once a year, neighbors across Austin (and other communities) gather at local block parties. It’s called National Night Out, and the 27th Annual National Night Out will take place on October 5. Hosting a block party is easy and fun –



and it’s a great way to meet your neighbors. Our association is compiling a list of neighborhood block parties.

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
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Neighborhood Safety

Crime Trends

Last issue's safety column had good news and bad news. This month, it's better news and not-so-great news. The updated crime statistics, as of June, are shown in the graph below. It shows that residential theft and burglary (the lower two lines) were down again in June, with only two incidents. Automotive burglary, however, is still high, with six incidents in June.



Bottom line is that crooks aren't breaking into our houses so much, but they are coming after our cars. That's bad – but you can take some simple steps to protect your car: remove valuables and lock the doors.

Please continue to be alert about what's happening on your street. If something "doesn't feel right," call 911.

Landscape Rebates and Tree Grant Proposals

If you've been thinking of replacing grass in your yard with a low-water alternative, this could be a good time to do it. On July 1, the City of Austin launched its Landscape Conversion Incentive Program that rebates \$20 for every 100 sq. ft. converted from turf to native landscape, and \$30 for every 100 sq. ft. converted from turf to a non-irrigated landscape such as gravel, crushed granite, mulch or a rock garden. A minimum of 500 sq. ft. must be converted. Applications are accepted from December through February for spring installation and from June through August for fall installation. The Beautification Committee is working on a grant proposal to submit to the City of Austin's Urban Forest Grant Program. We're requesting money to purchase and plant trees to mitigate our neighborhood's urban heat island effect, which, bounded as we are by commercial development and freeways, is likely

If the grant proposal is approved, we'll need volunteers to help publicize the grant and to prepare for and coordinate planting. If we receive approval early this fall, planting could happen in late fall or early winter. The Beautification Committee will provide more information on the grant if the proposal is approved.

- Jumbo plastic zip bags (larger than a gallon)

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
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
