# New Business Spotlight: Hello, Goodnight

You may have noticed construction work going on at the east end of the Village Shopping Center.

With a scheduled opening in August, The Goodnight will feature a re-inspired boutique bowling alley and restaurant experience offering local cuisine.

Located at 2700 W. Anderson Lane, it has filled the former space of Fuddruckers, that vacated the 16,000-square-foot space in early 2011.

In addition to food and drinks, plans call for eight vintage bowling lanes, an 80 person social dining and cocktail lounge, two private conference parlors, four custom billiards tables, two table-tennis courts and shuffleboard.

When asked why the North Shoal Creek area was chosen for the business' location, Chief Marketing Officer Laci Moiser said, "We purposefully chose a North Austin location, because this area is the heart of such a great neighborhood and community; we are so excited to be the newest addition. We hope The Goodnight will be the kind of place where people see familiar faces and friends."

The hours of operation will be Sunday-Wednesday 10:30 a.m.-11 p.m. and Thursday-Saturday 10:30 a.m.-2 a.m.. The age policy will be 18+, 21+ after 10 p.m..

The City Council approved on first reading the requested rezoning of four acres of the property at 8100 Burnet Road (Ross Dress for Less) from CS to MF 6 (CO) for a planned multiple family complex on April 5.

Since then, hearings for second and third readings by the City Council have been pending and have not been scheduled.

# Signatures Collected for Traffic Calming

The March Neighborhood News included an article on the new City Local Area Traffic Mitigation Program, commonly referred to as Traffic Calming.

Under this program, applications for Speeding Mitigation were submitted in January for five neighborhood streets. Four were accepted after traffic surveys reflected the need for mitigation of speeding. Neighborhood streets accepted so far for speeding mitigation include: Ashdale Drive, Rockwood Lane south of Steck, Rockwood Lane north of Steck and Primrose Lane. Steck Avenue did not qualify under this program.

Packets were mailed to applicants in June for petitions to be signed by residents on the requested street. Completed petitions are required to be returned to the City by Aug. 1.

### **Update on Short Term Rentals**

Austin City Council will for the second time on Aug. 2 consider making legal what is currently illegal.

Homes in neighborhoods are currently not allowed to be rented out for a period of less than 30 days. Despite it being illegal, doing so has become a big business and growing issue in Austin. There are currently thousands of homes in Austin being used essentially as mini-hotels, being rented out for a day or two at a time. Single family residential zoning is created to protect homeowners from living next door to businesses.


North Shoal Creek Neighborhood Association voted last year to pass a resolution against commercial short term rental (non-homesteaded, non-owner occupied home rental for a period of less than 30 days) and in support of homeowners being able to rent out their personal homes that they occupy for short periods of time for a collective total of 90 days per year. This is in line with the position Austin Neighborhoods Council has taken on commercial short-term rentals. Last month the city council voted on first reading (first of three readings) to allow commercial short term rentals after hours of citizen testimony on the topic. ### **Water Restrictions Downgraded**

Austin's summers are brutally hot, but luckily we've been receiving a little bit of rain these past couple of months.

The recent rain has brought enough relief that the city has decided to downgrade water restrictions. Residents can now water two times a week. The new water restrictions went into effect July 16. The schedule is as follows:

Odd Addresses can water: Wednesday and Saturday

Even Addresses can water: Thursday and Sunday

#### Resrictions include:

- Watering with an irrigation system, hose-end sprinkler, or soaker hose allowed one day per week according to address
- Hand-watering allowed any time on any day of the week
- Automatic irrigation systems can only operate before 5 a.m. on your watering day
- Hose-end sprinklers and soaker hoses can be used before
   5 a.m. or after 7 p.m. on your watering day
- Only wash your car at home before 5 a.m. or after 7 p.m. on your watering day and use a bucket or a hose with a

shutoff nozzle

- Ornamental fountains may not be operated
- Automatic fill valves for swimming pools and ponds must be turned off
- No charity car washes unless a waterless cleaning product is used instead of water
- No water to be served at restaurants unless requested
- No washing of sidewalks, driveways, parking areas or other paved areas

Watering is allowed only before 5 a.m. and after 7 p.m. to keep people from watering in the heat of the day and to minimize the water lost to evaporation. Previously, watering was allowed until 10 a.m.

### **Tree Planting Project Completed**

In February of this year, fifteen of our neighbors received a free tree planted in their yard from a grant awarded by the City of Austin's Urban Forest Grant Program.

This program works to preserve and replenish Austin trees as the city continues to grow. The project was approved by the membership in September 2010. The Beautification Committee applied and was awarded the grant a few months later.

The Committee requested funds to survey the North Shoal Creek neighborhood to find out where street shade was needed and to plant trees in the highest priority yards.

NSCNA was awarded \$8,000 to fund the tree planting project. A survey by an arborist was completed in Spring 2011 and the trees were planted the following spring, on Feb. 23, 2012. Fifteen young shade trees can now be seen throughout the neighborhood.

The new trees include live oaks, bur oaks, monterrey oaks, chinquapin oaks, and cedar elms and will add beauty as well as shade to our neighborhood for decades to come.

The Urban Forest Grant Program was established to promote

conservation and other projects that benefit Austin's urban forest, helping to preserve and grow Austin's canopy of trees. Projects eligible for funding include tree planting and preservation, education, public service announcements, disease control, and management of invasive species.

Our thanks to everyone who took part in this project and helped make it a great success and especially Mary Jane Wier, Sharon Justice and others of the Beautification Committee.

### **Curb Enthusiasm**

Home sales usually peak in the summer, as families search for homes and try to get their children acclimated to a new neighborhood and community before school begins in the fall. - Manage your mail. If you have a mailbox, you don't necessarily have to stick with the standard issue box. Check on the guidelines of your homeowner's association, and if you can, consider choosing a new mailbox that fits with your home's overall aesthetic. It'll add instant character to your home's first impression.
- Flowers. Whether you add planters, a bed or even window boxes, fresh flowers can instantly enhance your curb appeal by adding eye-catching pops of color. Just make sure you keep them well-watered (and obey any water restrictions!).


#### **Difficult**


Repaint. Painting your home's exterior can give it a
completely different look and feel. Consider your colors
carefully, though. Home painting is a big investment of
both time and money, and you don't want to end up with
a color scheme that clashes with your neighbor's house,
or that's eye-strainingly bright.

- Stone. Using local materials can add a charming touch to a home, especially if you're a fan of a rustic or distinctively textured look. If real stone is too costly, you could also consider a cultured or manufactured stone veneer. If you add either item, make sure your home is structurally sound and can handle the added weight.
- Adding curb appeal doesn't have to be for your potential buyers' eyes. In fact, making some of these changes may be worth it just because they make you feel prouder of your home and its improved appearance. If you're considering financing your renovations, you may be able to secure a low-rate loan or use a low-interest credit card to help you make upgrades without breaking your wallet.
