At NSCNA's January 7, 2014 General Membership Meeting, members elected a slate of 4 officers and 7 directors. 2014 Officers are Elizabeth Ray, President; Mike Blood, Vice-President; Karen Denton, Secretary; and Lois McEvoy, Treasurer.

2014 Directors are Levi Bullock, Barbara Gaston, Sharon Justice, Dallas Maham, Erin Poole, Kenneth Webb, and Jeri Wines.

Thank you to the Nominating Committee (chair, Erin Poole; members, Ernie Garcia, Sharon Justice, Tomas Rodriguez, and Jeri Wines) and to the Election Committee (Jon and Julie Menegay) for their help in suggesting candidates and handling the election.

NORTH SHOAL CREEK NEIGHBORHOOD PLANNING BEGINS

Something important is going to happen in North Shoal Creek in April or May: the kick-off meeting of our neighborhood's planning process. It'll be the first of a year-long series of meetings that will end with the Austin City Council's approval of a North Shoal Creek Neighborhood Plan which, good or bad, will become the blueprint for how our neighborhood grows and changes over the next 20 to 30 years.

I'm writing this editorial to ask North Shoal Creek residents to please participate in the process. Like all of Central Austin, North Shoal Creek faces several difficult issues. If we're going to create a successful plan, a sizeable subset of our residents will need to bring their knowledge, experience, and creativity to the process. So, when notification of the kick-off meeting arrives, please mark it "important," add it to your calendar, and make time to attend.

Here are my best guesses as to the topics our planning sessions will cover. They're complex and interesting topics, and they represent both risk and opportunity for our neighborhood:

Affordability: Housing in Central Austin is increasingly unaffordable. As property values rise, so do property taxes. Can we remain a largely middle-class neighborhood? Do we want to? Can older residents "age in place"? Will we have enough

child-friendly amenities that families with children will want to live in North Shoal Creek?

Density: Currently our neighborhood has predominately single -family residential housing with multi-family duplexes, apartments and condos at the edges. As property values zoom upward, affordable housing increasingly means multi-family. Can we keep our core of single-family housing? Do we want to? If we add multi-family housing, what kind and where should it go?

Traffic: Austin has a planning document for the next 30 years called Imagine Austin. In it, the area directly to our north is called the "North Burnet/Gateway Regional Center." Regional centers are described as "places where the greatest density of people and jobs and the tallest buildings in the regions will be located." This means more traffic on Burnet. Can Burnet handle increased traffic or will it overflow onto neighborhood streets? What transpor-

tation options besides buses are planned for Burnet? If transportation projects are planned, how will they be funded? How secure is their funding?

Green Space: Right now, our only park is the playground at Pillow and our only green space our lawns plus the banks of Shoal Creek. Can we have more green space? Do we want more green space? Can it be incorporated into new developments?

As I said, our neighborhood planning process offers both risk and opportunity. The more we residents participate, the more experience, knowledge, and creativity we bring to the process, the more likely it is that our North Shoal Creek Neighborhood-of-the-future will be one we'll continue to be proud of and will love to live in. Help guide our neighborhood's future by participating in this year's neighborhood planning process.

NEW DISTRICT 7 WEBSITE

Austinites will vote for a single City Council member to represent their district instead of six at-large members in this November's municipal election. North Shoal Creek is now part of District 7, and there's a new website with information about District 7 candidates and their platforms. The website is aptly named AustinDistrict7.org.

AustinDistrict7.org is unaffiliated and is intended to provide information on District 7 City Council and mayoral candidates. It also covers a range of topics related to our district including information about the communities that comprise District 7; issues important to quality of life in our area such as affordability, transportation, code enforcement and more; and

issues specific to north central Austin such as its lack of public spaces compared to other areas of town.

There's also a "News & Opinion" section for editorials and essays about District 7 politics and issues. Don't miss an article called "Five Challenges as North Shoal Creek Undertakes a Neighborhood Plan" by Steven Zettner. It describes the potential pitfalls that North Shoal Creek faces as it develops its neighborhood plan. It's a must-read for all North Shoal Creek residents.

A handy calendar of North Austin events is included on the website. According to the calendar, there's a District 7 candidates' forum scheduled for September 2014.

WE'RE NOT A TRENDY NEIGHBORHOOD (YET) A NEIGHBOR'S PERSPECTIVE

I recently browsed reviews of our North Shoal Creek neighborhood on Streetadvisor.com, a neighborhood rating and review site. Given how Austin is booming, I thought I'd check out what soon-to-be Austinites see when they search reviews of Austin's neighborhoods. As it turns out, our North Shoal Creek Neighborhood is favorably reviewed and even some of the not-so-favorable adjectives could be viewed as compliments.

Streetadvisor.com ranks us the 37th best neighborhood in Austin. That's more of an average rating because the site rates a total of 66 Austin neighborhoods. Until I read their list, I hadn't realized Austin has 66 neighborhoods. (In case you're interested, Hyde Park and Barton Hills are the #1 and #2 neighborhoods.)

Our reviewers describe us as "quiet,"
"convenient," and "affordable." One even calls us
"an awesome old Austin neighborhood." Others
say we're a "good area to raise your kids" and
"convenient to everything."

On the not-so-favorable side, we're "not as trendy as Crestview or Rosedale," and our night-life is described as "fairly tame." Another reviewer says "the neighborhood stands out in Austin for being on the quiet and rather boring side." Personally, I prefer quiet and boring neighborhoods, so I consider that description a compliment. I'd call us "a comfortable neighborhood with a relaxing vibe; a 60s/70s suburb that is, for the most part, aging gracefully."

Still, our neighborhood is changing, and change is like a Chinese ideogram that supposedly represents both opportunity and danger. We North Shoal Creekers need to be dexterous enough to take advantage of the opportunities while simultaneously sidestepping the risks. Our upcoming neighborhood planning process will be our best opportunity to control change and channel it where we want it. If we do it right, we can be a neighborhood that is aging gracefully and rejuvenating itself as well.

I plan to check again next year to see if our ranking has changed and if we've become trendy yet.

I'll be hoping not.


CHECK OUT OUR NSCNA WEBSITE

If you haven't already visited our website, take a few minutes to browse through it. You'll find useful information such as upcoming events (<u>Calendar</u> tab) and how to join our Yahoo group (<u>Email List</u> tab), along with an archive of our newsletters dating back to 1996 (<u>Newsletters</u> tab).

Our North Shoal Creek neighborhood was originally five subdivisions built during the 1960's and 1970's: Northtowne (built 1960-61); Northtowne West (built 1962-66); Allandale Place (built 1964-68); Allandale Estates (built 1966-1970), and Northwest Terrace (built 1966-1971).

Between 1997 and 1999, a sixth subdivision was added: Cottages of North Shoal Creek.

If you want to know which subdivision your home was originally in, select the <u>About</u> tab and then the <u>NSCNA History</u> tab. There you'll find a map of the six subdivisions. There's also a link on that page to *Trulia's website* where you can watch the growth of our neighborhood graphically. It's a mesmerizing time lapse and well-worth watching.

- By increasing our membership, you help strengthen NSCNA's position as an advocate for our neighborhood.


Dues are per household and cover a calendar year (through December 31). Because dues aren't proprated, the earlier in the year you join, the more months of membership your dues cover.
